| We have had lunchtime supervisors, teaching staff and specialised coaches out at lunchtimes to lead timetabled activities. They have also provided CPD to other staff to enable them to also lead activities without supervision. We have trained a number of children in Year 5, who assist with timetabled activities during lunchtimes. We have purchased additional equipment that can be used to enhance lunchtime activities. CPD We have engaged with the Stockport SHAPES alliance to provide CPD for all staff. This has included class teachers, teaching assistants and learning support assistants. | More children are taking part in timetabled activities during lunchtime, therefore having an active lunchtime. Increased confidence of staff to run lunchtime activities. More staff are leading timetabled activities, so more choices of activities are on offer for children to participate in. Children are accessing the equipment, enabling them to have active lunchtimes. Staff have more confidence when teaching lessons and supporting children in lessons. Staff feel more confident to run motor skills interventions and SEN PE groups. | Examples of activities include basketball, fitness, tag games, motor skills focused games. Examples of equipment available include fixed basketball post, basketballs, mini football nets. Staff have received CPD in dance, gymnastics, OAA, tennis. TAs and LSAs have received CPD in supporting SEN children with gross motor skills and in PE lessons. |

- We have enabled more children from KS1 and KS2 to partake in a wide range of tournaments, matches, festivals and competitions across Stockport.
- We have participated in intra and inter school level competitions.

We have offered a broader range of competitions for pupils to partake in.

- Children's attainment has improved as a result of staff's improved teaching of PE.
- There has been an increased percentage of children taking part in intra and inter school competitions.
- There have been more children trying different sports through festivals and tournaments.
- All children have participated in inter-school events.
- SEN children have had the opportunity to participate in a SEND specific events.

- Examples of inter school events include tag rugby, netball, football, girls football, golf, athletics.
- Examples of intra school events include girls football, mini marathon, olympic sports day.
- SEND specific event of Boccia.
